Avery Research Center's W. Marvin Dulaney Speaks at October Meeting on Black Belt-South Carolina Connection

Dr. W. Marvin Dulaney, Executive Director of the Avery Research Center for African American History and Culture in Charleston, SC and Associate Professor of History at the College of Charleston was the guest speaker at BBAAGHS' regular meeting in October.

Dr. Dulaney, one of the country's pre-eminent African American historians, addressed the group on the subject of *African American Records in South Carolina Plantation Records and Documents*.



"Seventy percent of African Americans who are descended from Black Belt slaves can trace their roots to South Carolina," said Dr. Dulaney.

Dr. Dulaney also gave a slide presentation about the Avery Research Center, its mission and holdings. There was a Q&A session following his talk.

BBAAGHS Sponsors Alabama Black Belt DNA Project

The Black Belt of Alabama DNA Project is a new tool for African Americans researching their central Alabama roots. Anyone who can trace their ancestry to Alabama's Black Belt Region from about 1840 through 1880 is welcome to participate.

Surname projects are often meaningless for African Americans whose family bonds may have been broken during the Enslavement Period or whose families experienced one or more name changes

after Emancipation. In addition, many African Americans—as many as 30% by some estimates—have European Y-DNA but have not been able to find the progenitors of their European lines. In these cases, researchers may have been able to trace their ancestry by traditional means back to the first census after Emancipation in which their ancestors were identified by surnames and then hit the proverbial "1870 Brick Wall". The DNA Project is designed to help them to scale that

barrier.

Chicago Lineage Society Makes Annual Trip to Alabama

In July 2006, Freedom Walk-America (FWA) sponsored its 3rd Annual Summer Youth Tour to Alabama for students, teachers and parents. They visited sites in Birmingham, Selma, Montgomery and Snow Hill in Wilcox County.

Freedom Walk-America, headquartered in Chicago, is a national lineage society that documents and preserves African American family his-

tory and culture.

FWA undertook a six-year research project that recovered 19th and early 20th century historical manuscripts including midwife records, plantation diaries, slave cemeteries, freedman marriage licenses, and normal-industrial school and one-room schoolhouse census records.

Their work eventually developed into the Southern Lineage Recovery

Collection (SLRC) with holdings from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, and Tennessee. Eventually these records will be accessible via the SLRC Digital Library and the open stack collections of genealogical societies throughout the U.S.

The Alabama Cemetery Preservation Alliance (ACPA) has been working since 2003 to increase public awareness and legislation in preserving, protecting and restoring cemeteries throughout Alabama especially those that are endangered, forgotten and neglected.

ACPA provides information on cemetery preservation techniques, the Alabama Historic Cemetery Register through workshops and on its website, www.alabama-cemetery-preservation.com.

ACPA achieves its goals through a network of county representatives, dedicated volunteers who are physically located in each of Alabama's 67 counties. They give their times, talent and energy to achieving

stones, organized Scout cemetery cleanups, mapped and read cemeteries, and encouraged organizations and family groups to care for their cemeteries.
